It takes courage to get help. You may be struggling with substance abuse issues around alcohol, prescription or street drugs, or smoking. You may be trying to support a friend, family member or client who needs help. If so, you will find a wide range of services in this directory addressing these needs.

Finding the right treatment

If you're struggling with substance abuse...

You'll find services and programs offering caring professional and peer support. There is something for every stage of recovery from detox and assessment, to counselling and self-help groups. To learn more about what you need before talking to someone, there are webtips at the back of this directory. Take a self-assessment online or get other information such as where and when self-help meetings are available in your area.

If you're supporting someone you care about...

You'll find information and services to help a friend or family member, and support for you. There are self-help groups to help you cope with the challenges ahead. If you are trying to find a way to talk to your kids about alcohol, drugs and smoking, prevention and education are available through local schools and organizations, or online through the helpful webtips at the back.

Looking for information and treatment for a client...

You'll find program and service information to help you evaluate what is available for your clients. Training is also available through some organizations to improve your knowledge and skills, and you'll find additional research online through the webtips at the back of this directory.

Get help in your area

Many of the organizations listed offer help in Whitehorse and the communities. Assistance with transportation, financial subsidies and daycare may also be available in some circumstances. Many organizations also offer legal assistance, referrals and court support, as well as employment training and housing to help support the transition to a healthier lifestyle.

Are you thinking of getting pregnant?
Your health is especially important during pregnancy or when planning a family. Your doctor, a health nurse or Canada's Prenatal Nutrition Program (see p. 8) can provide you with more information.

The Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Society of Yukon (FASSY) seeks to reduce the incidence of Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD) by improving the lives of people living with the effects of alcohol-related birth defects. Efforts include advocacy, education, resource development, research and continued community participation. FASSY's services in Whitehorse and the communities include:

- consultations and community workshops developed to increase understanding and to enhance the capacity of Yukoners to address issues around FASD
- one-to-one support for adults living with FASD, designed to assist them in finding and keeping safe housing and improve their quality of life
- supported skills and recreation activities for adults living with FASD, aimed to reduce isolation, fill leisure time with safe activities, enhance skills and develop friendships
- a discretionary/crisis fund which pays for emergency help for people with FASD and their families, including phone service, baby formula and crisis support
- peer supports and activities for women living with FASD, with a focus on healing and making healthier lifestyle choices
- a library of videos and books about FASD, developed and maintained for community use.

Probation officers throughout the territory provide counselling and supervision for offenders in the community. They also provide referrals to various rehabilitative and treatment programs including:

- anger management
- family counselling
- substance abuse treatment.

Substance abuse counsellors are available.

Programming focusing on substance abuse issues may vary. The White Bison program is currently being offered. This 12-step program is based on the Teachings of the Medicine Wheel.

Probation officers can provide general information to the public about the criminal justice system and its programs.

SERVICES PROVIDED

Not sure if you have a drinking or drug problem?

Talk to a counsellor to find the right help for you, or use one of the online self-assessment tools included with the webtips listed at the back of this directory.

Alcohol and Drug Services offers Prevention, Detox and Treatment services to individuals, families and groups on issues related to substance abuse. Community development and aftercare consultation services are also provided to Yukon communities. Services are available to all Yukon residents.

Detoxification Services

This is a non-medical unit where people can safely withdraw from alcohol and/or drugs. It is open 24 hours per day, 365 days per year. It offers drop-in support and referral.

Specific beds are reserved for women. Detox offers supportive counselling, drop-in and phone-in services. The length of stay varies depending on withdrawal severity, health status and treatment plans. All services are at no cost. Necessary personal hygiene items are provided. All admissions are voluntary.

Treatment Services

Outpatient/Counselling Services

Alcohol and Drug Services offers:

- brief screening and assessment of alcohol and drug problems
- individual counselling
- support to families

- services to clients with concurrent disorders
- aftercare support following inpatient treatment services
- referral to ongoing treatment
- self-help groups
- other support services.

Outpatient/Counselling Services also offers recovery support groups. Outreach counselling is also available for Whitehorse agencies.

Inpatient treatment services

Alcohol and Drug Services offers nine, 28-day inpatient (residential) gender-specific adult programs per year.

Youth treatment

Alcohol and Drug Services offers counselling services to all Whitehorse secondary schools as well as Whitehorse-based youth groups.

Counsellors will work with youth and their families to provide support and treatment services. Referrals may be made for families of youth to outpatient or inpatient treatment while at the same time providing assessment and treatment to youth.

Prevention Services

Education and prevention services include:

- information for the public
- workshops, training and presentations in the school
- public awareness campaigns
- an addiction-related library for service providers.

Community Outreach

Alcohol and Drug Services provides outreach services, such as assistance with program development, aftercare programs and community development, to Yukon communities.

The only requirement for membership is a desire to stop drinking. There are no dues or fees for membership; we are self-supporting through our own contributions.

AA is not allied with any sect, denomination, politics, organization or institution and does not wish to engage in any controversy. AA neither endorses nor opposes any causes.

The Al-Anon family groups include friends and relatives of alcoholics sharing their experience and providing support. Alateen includes young Al-Anon members, whose lives have been affected by someone else's drinking.

Boys & Girls Club runs a drop-in youth centre in downtown Whitehorse, providing a positive, healthy and safe space for youth to hang out. Drop-in centre programs are targeted at youth ages 12 to 18.

The club offers an indoor skateboard park, skate competitions, BMX nights, resume and employment search assistance, computers, internet, arts and crafts, games, local youth-driven events, summer adventure camps, leadership training, teen swim nights, Canada Games Centre nights and outdoor recreation.

We also offer some programs in partnership with the City of Whitehorse, aimed at youth ages eight to 11:

- swim nights
- Chillax'n Lounge at the Canada Games Centre
- skateboard programming
- Torch Club.

The Boys & Girls Club promotes alcohol- and drug-free spaces where youth can gather. Its motto is "A Good Place To Be." Its mission is to provide a safe, supportive place where youth can experience new opportunities, overcome barriers, build positive relationships and develop confidence and skills for life.

SERVICES PROVIDED

Bringing Youth Towards Equality (B.Y.T.E.) is mandated to unite Yukon youth to strengthen their voice, take action and bring about positive change for the wellbeing of everyone. B.Y.T.E. began in 1998 when a group of young people decided they wanted a forum to get together, share ideas and take action.

It is through this inception that B.Y.T.E. has created the On-Call Facilitation Team. This team of youth was trained by professionals to engage other youth in a variety of ways, ensuring fun, experiential and interactive methods. The team has been taught how to create powerful and vibrant programs and has learned to bridge cultural and generational gaps. It is currently trained in giving workshops on substance abuse, youth rights, leadership, anti-oppression, climate change, racism, violence prevention, social networking for social change, photography, yoga, meditation, dance, and 'zine making. Our team also has the ability to design and tailor other topic areas as requested. The On-call Team has been trained to provide workshops and facilitations aimed at helping rural youth make and maintain healthy lifestyle choices.

B.Y.T.E. also keeps an updated Online Community Calendar for events around the territory. B.Y.T.E. lends out from an issue-based library, gives away free clothing, distributes the Toxic Blend 'zine, offers a free computer for the public, celebrates Youth Week and Canada Day annually, and puts on an annual Yukon youth gathering. B.Y.T.E. has improved its office space to lessen its impact on the earth. B.Y.T.E. also connects young people with opportunities ranging from employment and international exchanges, to attendance at national youth conferences and being represented and heard in community forums.

The Canada Prenatal Nutrition Program (CPNP) funds community-based projects for prenatal and post-natal, at-risk women with children up to one year of age. This program improves access to services in an effort to reduce the incidence of unhealthy birth weights, improve the health of both infant and mother, and encourage breastfeeding.

As a comprehensive program, the services provided include food supplements, nutritional counselling, support, education, referral, and counselling on health and lifestyle issues.

The Child Development Centre (CDC) provides early intervention and support for children from birth to school age so they can develop to their full potential. CDC believes that the best services include the involvement of the child, family and professional working together.

Programs currently offered include infant development; a therapeutic pre-school program; speech and language groups; and community-based services including home visits and support to childcare programs. Clinical teams travel to all Yukon communities. Program assistants are hired to work with individual children in most Yukon communities.

Services are available in the child's home, at the childcare facility, and at the Child Development Centre. They are provided by developmental therapists, teachers, speech language pathologists, occupational therapists, physiotherapists, psychologists and other support personnel.

Referrals

Referrals may come from families, physicians, public health nurses or other professionals. Families must be aware of the referral. Referrals for assessments can also be made to Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD) diagnostic and support teams.

Fees were eliminated in March 2008, except for children enrolled as peer models in the preschool program.

Residential Youth Treatment Services (RYTS)

RYTS provides both short-term care for children at the Children's Receiving Home and long-term, group home care.

Children's Receiving Home

The Children's Receiving Home provides short-term placements for children, 12 to 18 years old, in need of a place of safety. It also provides supervised visits for families, stabilization and short-term care. Referrals are from Family and Children's Services.

Group homes

Children in care of the director may be referred to the RYTS program by Family and Children's Services through the Placement Review Committee. RYTS operates four homes, which provide programming for behaviourally difficult youth between 10 and 18 years of age and their families.

Child Abuse Treatment Services (CATS)

CATS provides professional training workshops, as well as consultation and education, for people working with children. This Yukon-wide service is also offered to members of the community and service organizations.

Individual, family and group counselling are available for children who have been physically, sexually or emotionally abused, and children who have witnessed family violence.

The unit is staffed by one supervisor, a full-time intake worker and five full-time counsellors.

Confidentiality

Confidentiality is a priority, but instances of unreported abuse will be disclosed to Family and Children's Services for follow-up investigation.

Need additional training to work more effectively with children?

Workshops and professional consultation are offered by such organizations as the Children's Assessment and Treatment Services and Alcohol and Drug Services.

Restorative Community Conferences Program is an opportunity for youth who have been charged with an offence or directed under the act to meet with those impacted by their behaviour in a facilitated process. Here, they address what is the nature of the harm done, take responsibility and repair it.

Program standards

Conferences conducted under the act adhere to the Yukon Guidelines for the Convening and Conducting of Conferences under YCJA.

Conferences are led by facilitators trained in the standards set out under the guidelines.

Educational

The program provides training in restorative justice, principles, practices and implementation, as well as conference facilitator training.

Aboriginal courtworkers

Aboriginal courtworkers provide legal information (not advice) to First Nations people who have been accused of, or charged with, offences. This includes information about how to apply for legal aid and how to get a lawyer.

Courtworkers explain court procedures and the roles of the people involved, and make sure their clients know what is required of them in court. For some offences, courtworkers can speak in court on behalf of their clients.

This service is available to adult First Nations members. Clients can contact a courtworker by phone, by visiting the office, or at court. In collaboration with other community workers, courtworkers will identify counselling and other services for their clients.

Resolution health support worker

Resolution health support workers identify claimants of Indian residential schools. They also support and explain the Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) process to claimants, and provide culturally appropriate emotional support services during all phases of the resolution process. This service can be accessed at any stage of the ADR or litigation process. (See also program under Health Canada, page 30.)

The success of the following programs is strengthened by the interaction of students, parents and teachers, as well as community supports. Not all programs listed are available in all schools.

Health and Career Education K-9 and Planning 10 Curriculum

Substance misuse prevention is part of the curriculum from kindergarten to grade 10. The following topics are covered:

- safe and unsafe substances
- negative effects of using substances
- harm from unsafe substances
- influences of substance misuse
- avoiding substances
- strategies for healthy choices
- recognizing and refusing unsafe substances
- consequences of substance misuse.

The program is delivered in the classroom to all students from kindergarten to grade 10. In elementary school, the curriculum is delivered either by the classroom teacher or the school counsellor. In high school, programming is generally delivered by the health and career education teacher.

Baby Think it Over

Supported by the RCMP, Baby Think it Over involves students caring for a computerized doll, some of whom exhibit characteristics of babies born with FASD. This program is delivered at Porter Creek Secondary and may be available at other schools upon request.

Canines for Safer Schools

This pilot program is being offered at Porter Creek Secondary School to assist in promoting a drug-free learning environment in the schools. Porter Creek is the only school in the Yukon that offers the program, which helps to build a relationship between the students and the drug counsellor.

DARE (Drug Abuse Resistance Program)

Sponsored by the RCMP, DARE is a drug and alcohol program delivered primarily to grade 5 students. RCMP come into the classroom and work with students on issues around self-esteem, drugs and alcohol. This program also helps to build a positive relationship between RCMP and students.

Drug and alcohol resources

These are assorted curricular kits, including activities and videos designed for the substance misuse section in the Health and Career Education and Planning. Ten courses are available.

Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASD)

Teachers regularly integrate different types of teaching strategies for working with students with FASD. Education staff in the Special Programs Unit provide ongoing guidance and learning opportunities for teachers and parents working with students with FASD.

Yukon FASD Diagnostic and Support Team: A Yukon-based FASD diagnostic and support team is in place through the Child Development Centre to assist in the early diagnosis of FASD and to help families access support services at the preschool age. These services can be accessed only if there is confirmed prenatal consumption of alcohol.

Making a Difference: This is an instruction manual for teachers that focuses on 12 essential elements for working with students with FASD. This manual is being used by most schools in the Yukon.

Steps to Success for Teaching Students with FASD: This program is designed to assist educators in the development and use of effective strategies for students who are having difficulty coping in the school, both educationally and/or behaviourally. Some of these students may have been prenatally exposed to alcohol. The focus is on building networks and links between the school, community and other agencies in order to:

- develop a teacher training model and support manual
- mentor and train school-based support
- develop a culturally relevant grades 1 to 12 curriculum on FASD.

The designers of this program work closely with the Special Programs Unit at the Department of Education.

Trying Differently: This “Guide for Daily Living and Working with FASD and other Brain Differences,” produced by Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Society of Yukon, is supplied to classroom teachers throughout the Yukon.

Keeping Youth Drug Free – A Book for Parents

A resource for Yukon parents developed by SASSY (Substance Abuse Strategy and Solutions for Yukon) to provide information and prevention strategies on the use of drugs by youth.

PARTY Program

High school students go to Whitehorse General Hospital to observe and participate in the stark reality of the effects of alcohol. Students are given the medical point of view through the use of graphic videos, testimonials and other means. There may be alternative ways of presenting this information to students who live outside of Whitehorse.

Personality Dimensions

A program available to schools that provides teachers with an opportunity to help youth make good decisions, learn about themselves and build positive self-esteem.

Second Step

A comprehensive counselling program used in Yukon schools to reduce bullying, drug and alcohol abuse, and other issues. Second Step is delivered in the school from kindergarten to grade 10.

Steps to Respect

This comprehensive counselling program is designed to help students make healthy life decisions. This program is also delivered from kindergarten to grade 10.

Street Drugs

A program designed to aid teachers and administrators on what to look for in youth drug culture.

Truth About Drinking and Truth About Drugs

Both of these resources describe the effects of either alcohol or drugs on people, both youth and adults.

- access to psychological assessments for children who may be at risk
- parent and family support by social workers
- respite support for parents with children at risk of abuse or neglect

- emotional support services of a community-based Resolution Health Support Worker (delivered via Council of Yukon First Nations and Liard First Nation)

Health Canada provides eligible First Nations people and Inuit with a specified range of medically necessary health-related goods and services when they are not covered through private insurance plans or provincial or territorial health and social programs.

Non-Insured Health Benefits (NIHB) include:

- prescription drugs
- over-the-counter medication
- medical supplies and equipment
- short-term crisis counselling
- dental care
- vision care
- medical transportation, including to out-of-territory Health Canada-funded National Native Alcohol and Drug Abuse Program (NNADAP) treatment centres.

An eligible recipient must be a resident of Canada and one of the following:

- a registered Indian according to the *Indian Act*
- an Inuk recognized by one of the Inuit Land Claim organizations

It is important to be supported through this difficult time and find a healthy way to express these feelings.

Hospice Yukon provides:

- one-on-one and family support with a lay counsellor
- support for caregivers and professionals
- a resource library of books, videos and audio cassettes
- agency and volunteer training
- Living with Loss: a public education workshop; four times a year
- Healing Touch (energy therapy) on Wednesday afternoons
- grief support groups.

If you live in one of the communities, Telehealth and telephone support are available, including conference calls. Materials from the library and other handouts are available for mailing.

No referral is required nor are there charges.

Kaushee's offers help with temporary and transitional housing for women and children.

Safe, supportive crisis and longer term accommodation is provided for women and their children who are in crisis due to violence and/or abuse.

Kaushee's Place maintains a home-like atmosphere where safety is the first priority. Women and their children can stay in the transition home for up to 30 days.

In emergencies, taxi fare will be paid within Whitehorse city limits to the transition home.

Low-cost second-stage housing is available for women who need independent housing with some support, for up to six months.

Kaushee's Place offers support, listening and referral services to inform women of their options. For support and advocacy, the staff can accompany women to appointments. Referrals will be made to other agencies as needed.

Silent and Invisible is a program that responds to the needs of older abused women (50+) who may require extra support and assistance to overcome specific barriers.

The KDFN Health Centre continues to be the only First Nation operated health centre north of the 60th parallel. The health centre is also unique in its integration of programming that forms a continuous stream from pre-birth to death. Health services are provided by a team which includes registered nurses, a community health representative and elder support workers, and a contract physician.

Clinic services

A nurse is available to provide health assessments, ongoing health monitoring, teaching and education, assistance with illness management, communicable disease control and immunizations, referrals and support. Appointments may also be made in advance.

A doctor's clinic at the KDFN Health Centre is now available for those clients who do not have a family doctor. A doctor offers a clinic once a week and appointments can be made through the home and community care nurse.

Immunizations

In addition to the well-baby clinics that provide developmental screens, health checks and information, immunizations are given to babies at two, four, six, 12 and 18 months of age. These are followed by booster immunizations before the child starts school. Adult immunizations available at the health centre include the flu vaccine, pneumomax and tetanus boosters. Tuberculosis (TB) screenings are also available following a consultation with the community health nurse.

Parents and children

Child, Youth and Family Health believes a strong community begins with healthy children and families. Healthy Babies, Healthy Generations (HBHG) is a program designed to support parents through their pregnancy and for the first 18 months of the baby's life. This includes services such as prenatal care, labour and delivery teaching, monthly luncheons, post-partum care and well-baby clinics.

Community Justice

The Community Justice program is committed to providing culturally based holistic services to assist community members who are involved in the criminal justice system. The Justice Program facilitates processes that involve reconciling victims and offenders including empowering victims. The Community Justice program also provides opportunities for the community to use its voice in criminal, victim services and child protection matters. If you need advice or assistance, please contact the Justice office.

Many Rivers (formerly Yukon Family Services Association) is a private, not-for-profit, charitable agency that provides a range of counselling and support services to individuals, families and communities throughout the Yukon.

Fees may apply. Material in the Whitehorse office library can also circulate to communities.

Counselling

Counselling is available for individuals, families, couples and groups. Staff is available to discuss your options and answer questions and concerns. When clients phone for an appointment in the Whitehorse office, the intake counsellor will ask for some information and set up a first appointment.

Counselling is also available for children. Parental consent is required for children under 12 years of age. The ability of youth over 12 years of age to give their own consent is considered.

Referrals are not necessary, but may come from other agencies.

Play therapy for children: Children can receive counselling using a variety of talk and play therapy techniques specially designed for their age group.

Employee assistance programs: These programs are designed to assist the employee and/or their family members with problems that may arise.

Other programs and support groups

Many Rivers' family education programs aim to increase parents' confidence and ability to offer a supportive and healthy environment for their children. Availability of programs in each community varies.

Life After Birth: Offers a range of supports for women experiencing postpartum depression and anxiety.

Mothering Your Baby – The First Year: An education and support group for new mothers with babies under one year. Provides an opportunity for mothers to talk about the ups and downs of mothering, and living and learning with a new baby.

Peer-led Moms Groups: As a continuation of *Mothering Your Baby – The First Year*, Many Rivers provides a weekly meeting place for moms to get together until their children are actively crawling or walking.

For the Sake of the Children I and II: This two-part workshop assists parents in keeping their children's needs at the forefront during and after separation or divorce. The first workshop covers children's needs, alternatives to court and parenting plans, and the second focuses on communication skills parents can use to support their children through the separation and divorce experience.

Kids in Transition: A support group to aid children in identifying and expressing their feelings around the divorce or separation of their parents.

Nobody's Perfect Parenting Program: An educational and supportive workshop for parents of children from birth to five years of age.

Parent-Child Mother Goose Program: A supportive, fun group experience for parents and their babies and/or young children that focuses on the pleasures and benefits of using rhymes, songs and stories.

Youth Outreach Program: Offers a mobile, accessible counselling and advocacy service to street-involved and high-risk youth. Generally the youth are between the ages of 12 and 24 and are

All MADD services are provided free of charge.

We provide a hands-on program for use in schools throughout the Yukon. The Simulated Impaired Driving Experience (SIDNE) go-cart can be operated by both students and adults. This go-cart follows a course set up by MADD and uses a remote control device to demonstrate, in a safe environment, what it feels like to be in a vehicle with someone who is impaired. MADD Whitehorse is proud to have the first of its kind in Canada.

The full program includes additional hands-on and visual aids designed to teach about the risks of impaired driving including:

- the fatal reflection program using digital imaging to construct accident scenarios
- Intoxiclock, which calculates potential impairment
- Distract-a-match, a game showing the need for concentration on the road.

The van travels the streets of Whitehorse six nights a week, going to locations where its clients require services. The van complements existing services, providing:

- safety and support (nutrition such as coffee, tea, soup, bread, sandwiches, water; personal care items; clothing and blankets)
- outreach counselling and education related to issues of substance abuse, employment, housing, family violence; advocacy
- health services (clean needles and other harm reduction supplies; condoms; nursing assessment and wound management; public health information and education; public health procedures)
- referrals to other agencies.

The free van service is coordinated by Many Rivers Counselling and Support Services in partnership with Blood Ties Four Directions Centre, Kwanlin Dün First Nation and Kaushee’s Place Transition Home. Staff include an outreach van coordinator, health educators, a health promotion worker, an HIV/Hepatitis C counsellor, youth outreach counsellors, generalist counsellors and registered nurses.

The Skookum Jim Friendship Centre is a community house committed to bettering the spiritual, emotional, mental and physical well-being of First Nation peoples. We promote friendship and understanding between all people.

The ***Prenatal Nutrition Outreach Program*** promotes and supports the health of all women during their pregnancies, and supports nursing mothers and their babies up to the age of one year. There are weekly drop-in sessions for participants.

The ***Traditional Parenting Program*** teaches parenting practices and values to First Nations people through the knowledge of the elders.

The ***Tan Sakwathan Youth Diversion Program*** uses a holistic approach to provide early intervention and healthier alternatives for First Nation youth and their families who come in conflict with the law. This program aims to assist them to live happy, productive lives. It uses elders, guest speakers, traditional teachings, workshops, referrals, psychologists, community involvement and health recreational activities, as needed.

The ***Recreation Program*** provides programs that reflect the well-being of both rural and urban people, and supports initiatives of sport, recreation and culture that are important to maintaining community-based programs. Annually, this program hosts the Skookum Jim Rediscovery Wilderness Camp, the Folklore Show, Cultural Enhancement Programs and other important healing initiatives.

The ***Urban Multipurpose Aboriginal Youth Centre (UMAYC)*** was designed to provide urban aboriginal youth with a wide range of culturally based programs, services and activities that are locally controlled and designed in conjunction with aboriginal youth. These programs are structured to empower youth to face challenges and determine their own future with a sense of pride in a culturally relevant environment.

The ***Student Training and Financial Services Program*** includes work life job skills, Northwest Territories post-secondary education, Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development (DIAND) National Child Benefit Fund, and the Aboriginal Human Resource Development Program.

After School Tutoring Program provides one-on-one tutoring, daily homework sessions, studying tips and tools to increase academic confidence, as well as resource materials for students applying to post-secondary institutions.

Youth Advisory Council is involved with program planning, development and delivery of all UMAC programs. This is comprised of eight youth from the community between the ages of 15 to 24, but youth outside the age range may still be considered.

The Youth Achievement Centre (YAC) offers a variety of programs for 12- to 17-year-old young people and youth-at-risk who may not be participating in school or are working full-time. Programs are offered during the day and early evening. All activities start and finish at the centre.

The following programs are offered on a quarterly basis but not all programs are offered each quarter. Contact YAC for current program information.

Let's Talk Drugs: Secondary prevention and education program exploring personal substance abuse issues and offering general information on drugs, and the difference between use, abuse and addiction. Consists of five 1.5 hour sessions.

Liquor Ticket Program: An alcohol-related educational program facilitated in partnership with Alcohol and Drug Services, which provides an opportunity for youth to examine realities and risks that alcohol creates in a young person's life. Consists of one two-hour group session.

Crime Cycle Awareness: Uses an educational approach to explain to participants the factors that contribute to anti-social and inappropriate behaviour. The information is then used by each youth to develop a personal relapse prevention plan. Each youth must finish making their own plan in order to complete the program.

CONTINUES ON NEXT PAGE

Anger management: Uses an educational treatment approach to train young people in skills needed to manage anger and other emotions associated with the occurrence of aggression and anti-social behaviour. The program involves ten 1.5-hour sessions. There is a pre-intake assessment for each participant.

Set in Motion: A self-esteem program.

Community support project: Helps youth complete community service hours and restitution, as assigned by the courts.

Recreation and fitness: Highlights the importance of fitness and nutrition in one's daily life. May include activities such as skiing, swimming, fitness training, hiking and biking.

Lunch and noontime drop-in: Provides lunch and access to various activities.

Woodworking: Offered as a co-ed day or after-school program. This offers a positive, structured environment for hands-on skill development. Work schedules are designed to fit the needs and abilities of individual participants, with time commitments from one half-day per week up to four days per week. This program works best for youth who are available to participate for at least six consecutive weeks.

Education outreach: This program is a collaborative effort between YAC and the Department of Education. Youth at YAC who are unable to attend school for various reasons may be interested in connecting with a teacher a few times a week or working towards a plan to reintegrate into school.

Arts Night: Explores a variety of mediums in a relaxed atmosphere.

Young Men's Sports: Focuses on attendance, participation, comprehension and fair play. Recreational activities include floor hockey, basketball, bowling, indoor soccer, movies, weight training and archery. Outdoor activities take place weather permitting.

Young Women's Group: Focuses on fun and participation, and providing a safe and supportive environment. Activities include movies, bowling, silk screening, candle-making, stained glass, games, and outdoor activities, weather permitting. Issues explored include abuse prevention, stress and frustration, self-awareness and feeling good about oneself, communication, exercise and nutrition.

Various summer camps: Offers female, male and co-ed camps.

The panel meets weekly to discuss cases before they go to court. Panel members explore appropriate services for youth and make recommendations to suitable extra-judicial measures programs in Whitehorse.

Appendix I: Small changes can make a difference

Drug-free

- Get treatment and support as you withdraw from drugs.
- Get medical help for any health issues as a result of drug use and for quitting.
- Consider using harm reduction supplies or alternative medications.
- Consider the feelings that trigger your drug use and talk about them with a sponsor through Narcotics Anonymous, counsellor or peer support.
- If you slip, start again and get support as you try again.
- Choose healthier activities and supportive people.
- Think about the positive reasons to quit.

Alcohol-free

- Find a program or self-help group that offers support.
- Get medical help for any health issues as a result of alcohol use.
- Think about your reasons for drinking and quitting.

- Get back on track if you slip.
- Find positive activities to get involved in. Seek out alcohol-free events in your community.
